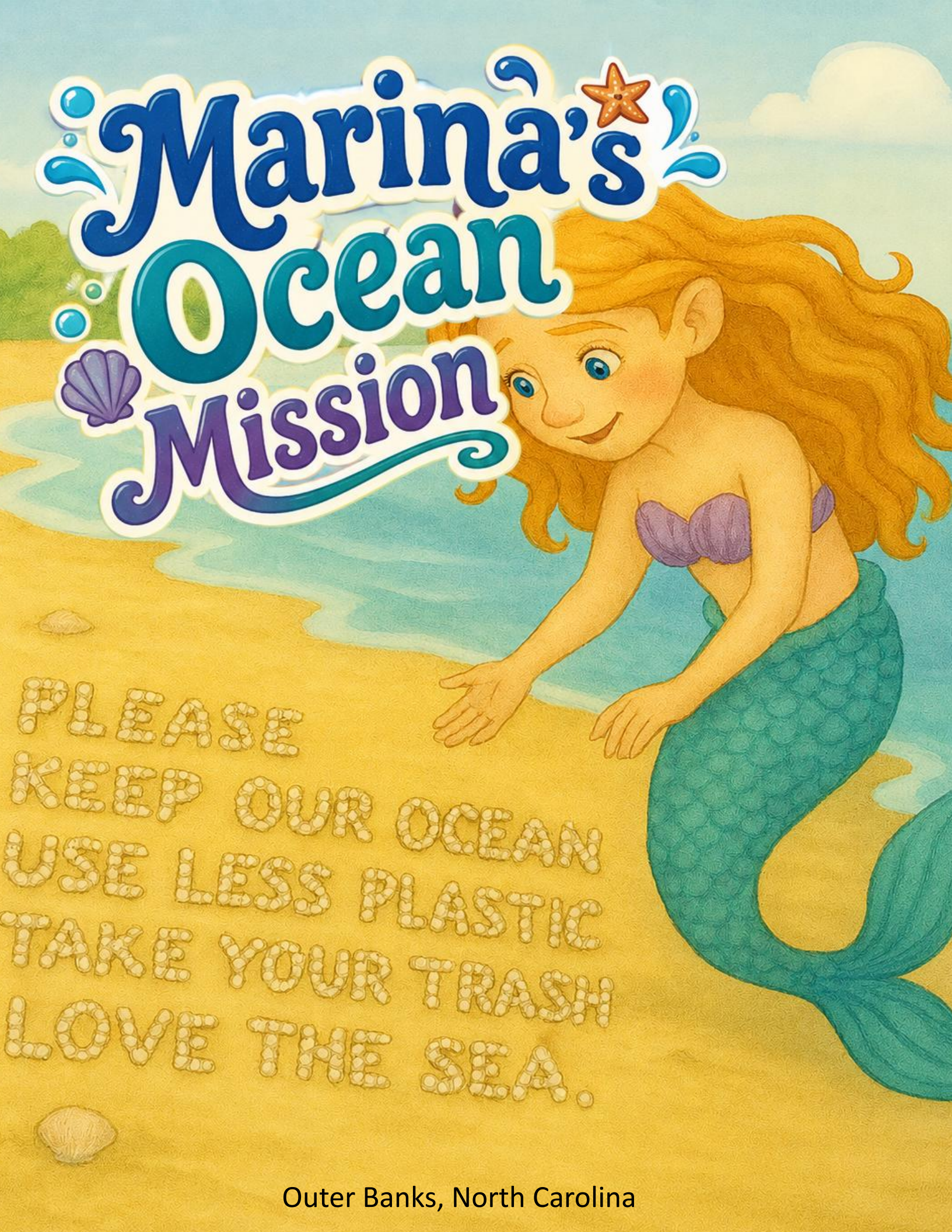

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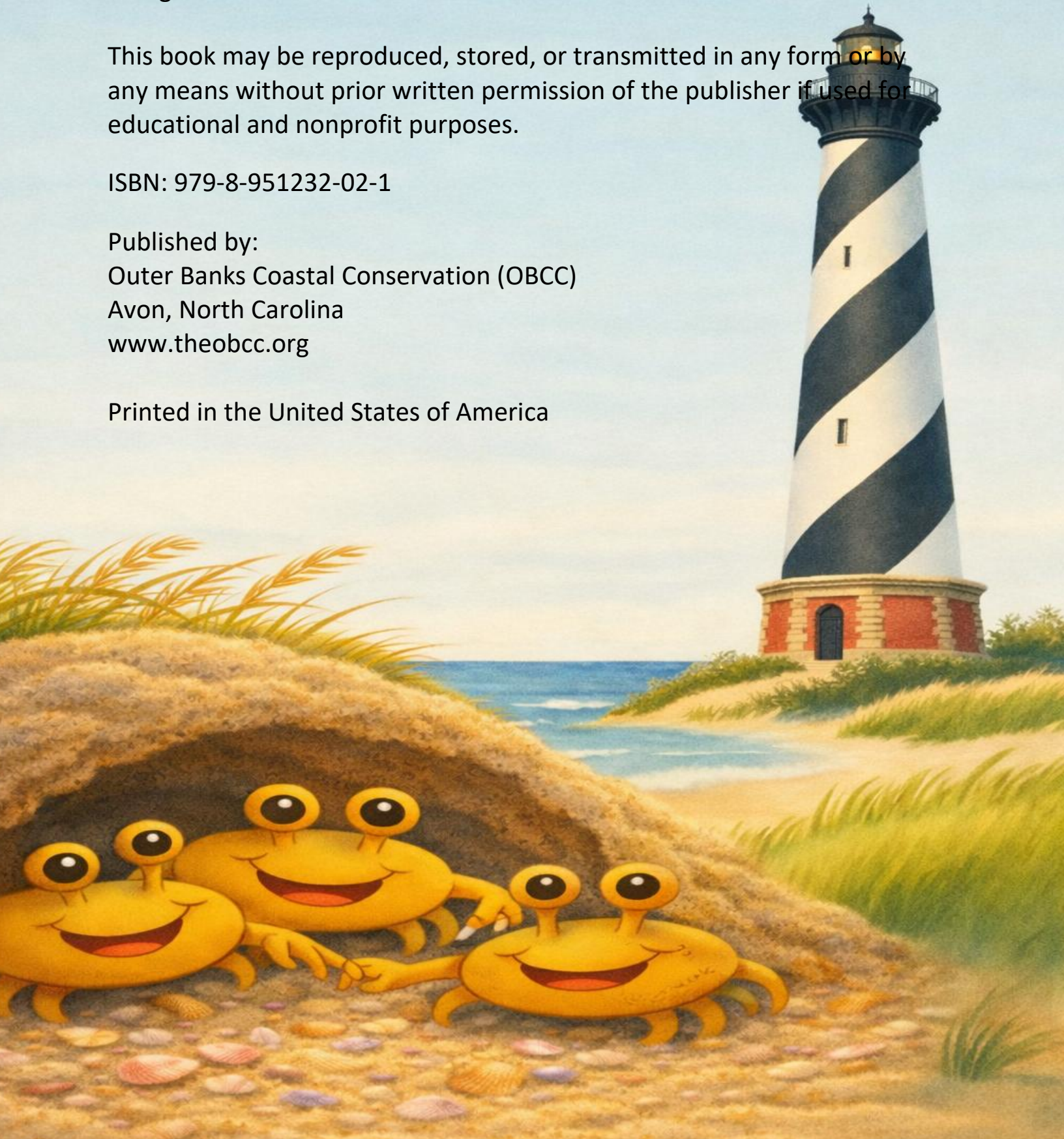

All materials in this book may be freely downloaded, shared, printed and used for educational or nonprofit purposes.

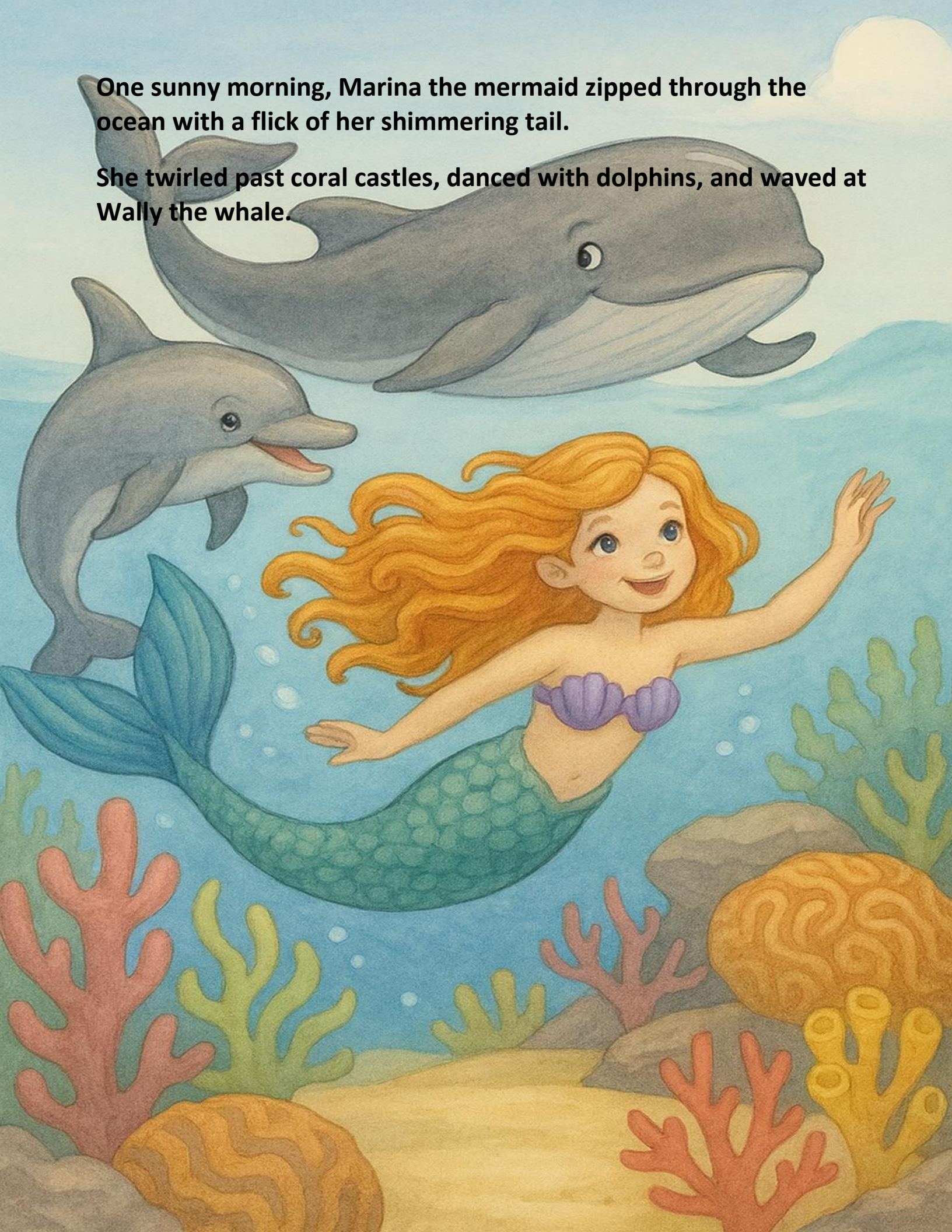
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**One sunny morning, Marina the mermaid zipped through the ocean with a flick of her shimmering tail.**

**She twirled past coral castles, danced with dolphins, and waved at Wally the whale.**

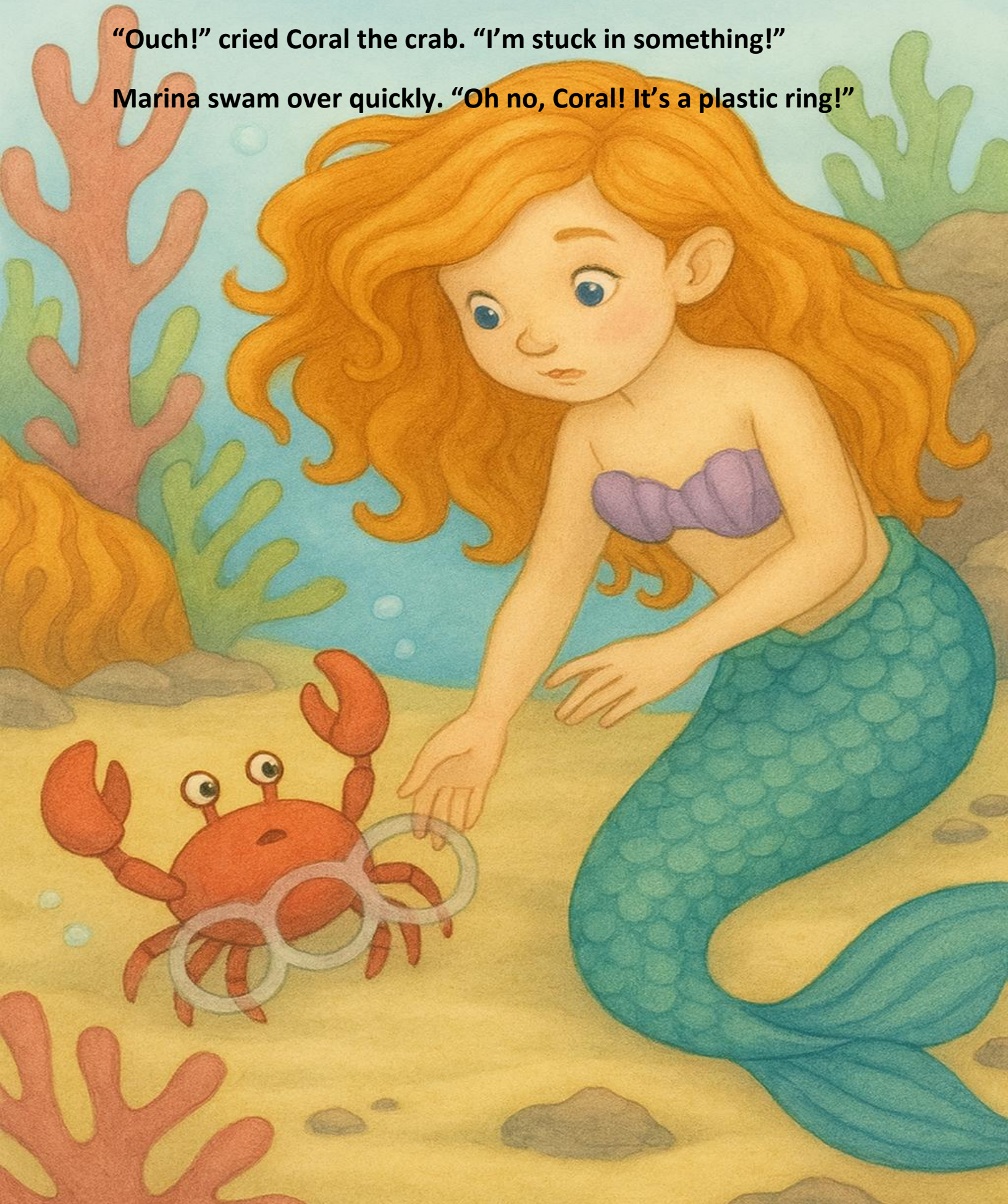




But something wasn't right.

"Ouch!" cried Coral the crab. "I'm stuck in something!"

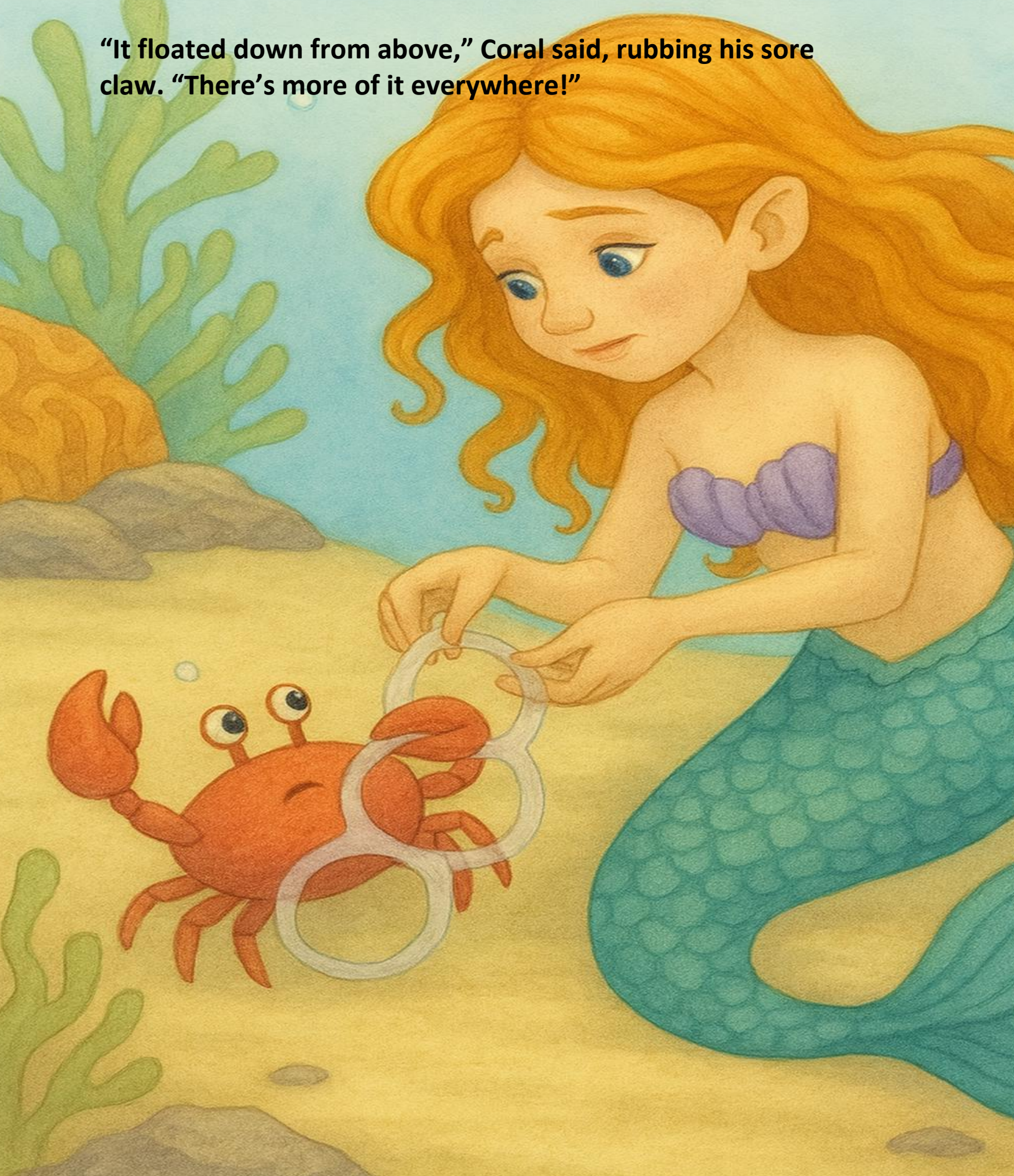
Marina swam over quickly. "Oh no, Coral! It's a plastic ring!"

"It floated down from above," Coral said, rubbing his sore claw. "There's more of it everywhere!"





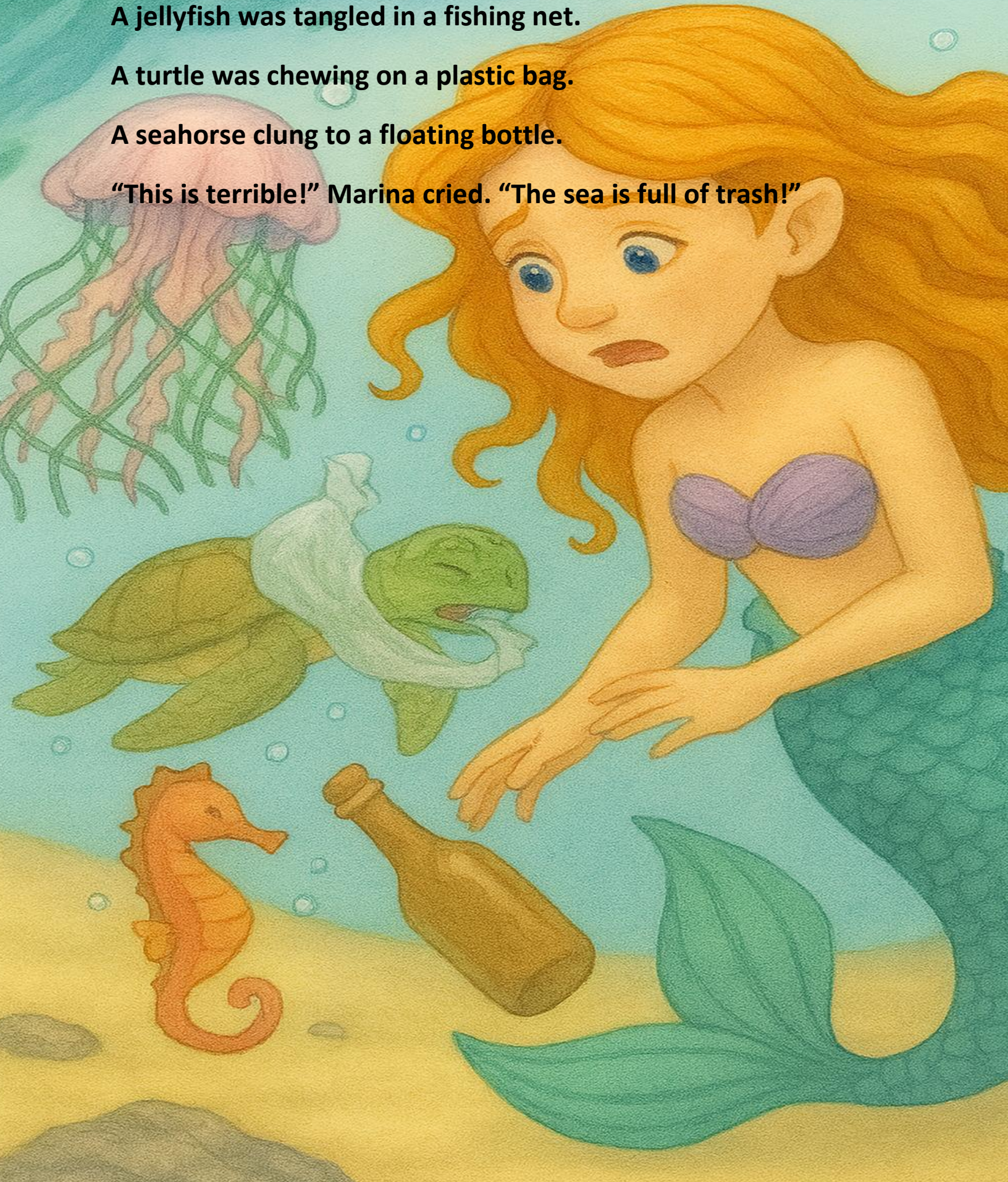
**Marina darted through the water, looking around. She gasped.**

**Back in the sea, Marina smiled.**

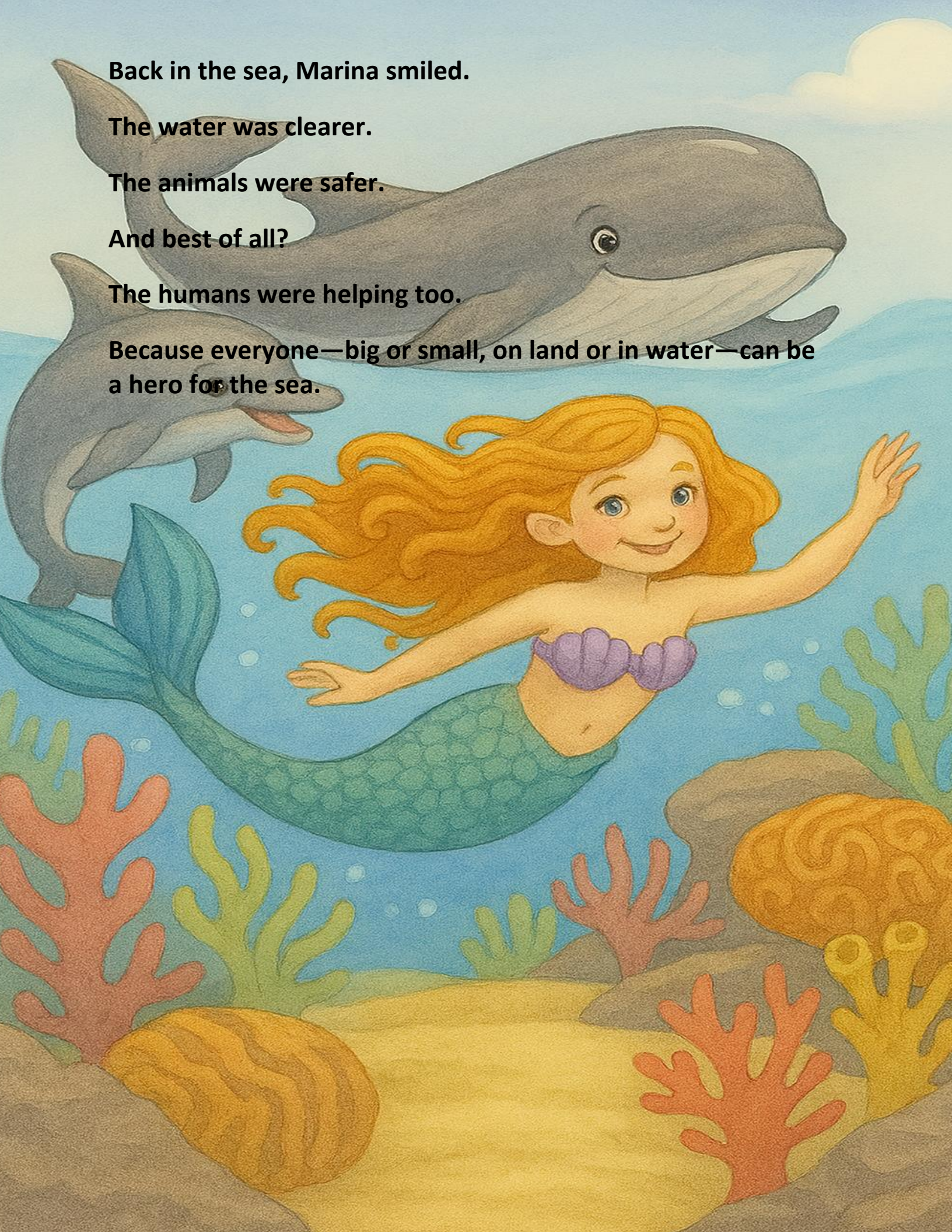
**The water was clearer.**

**Because everyone—big or small, on land or in water—can be a hero for the sea.**





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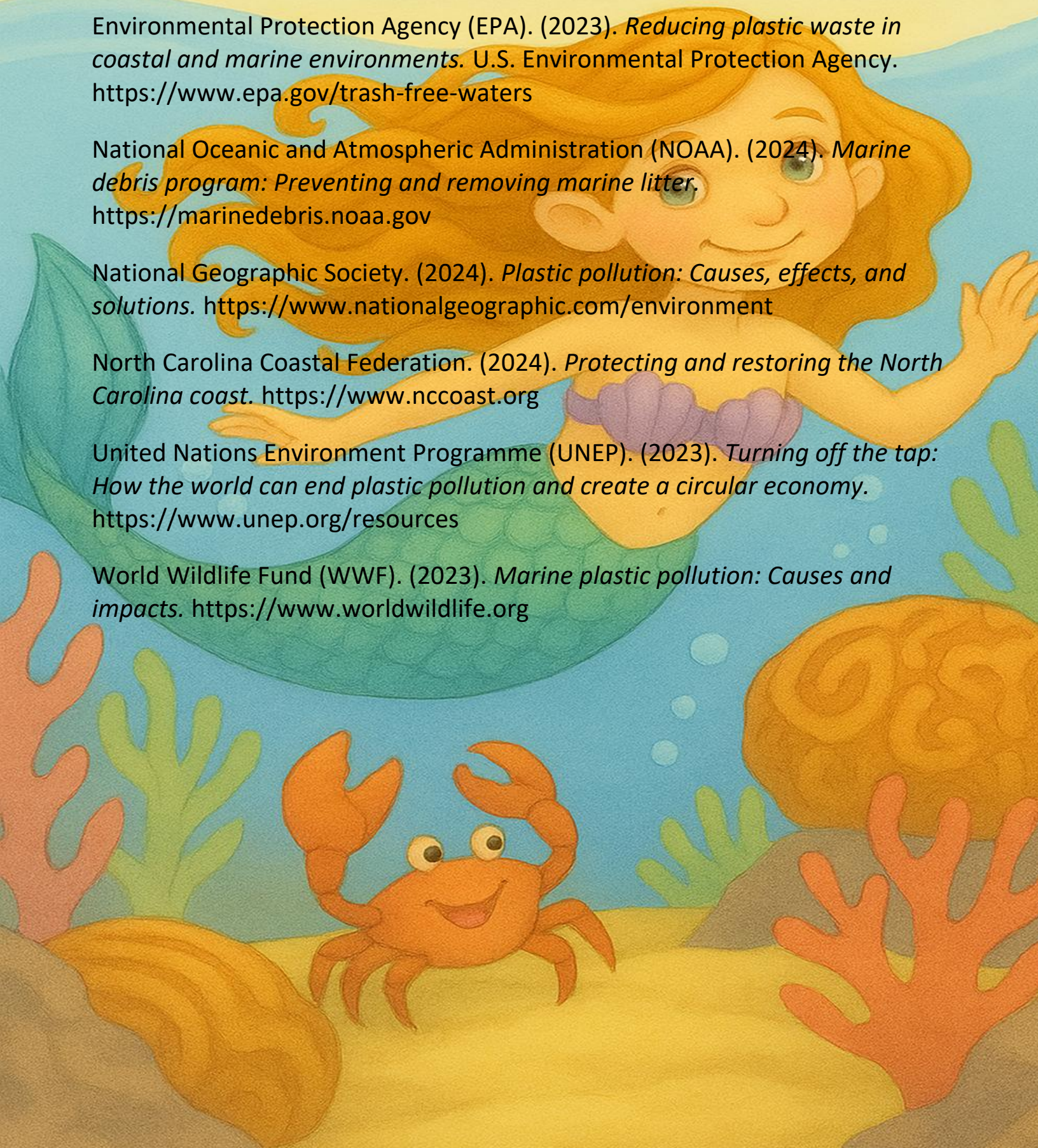
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# Marina's Ocean Mission
