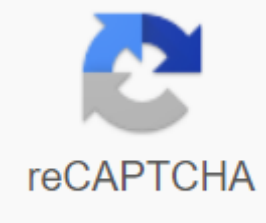

Your education should not stop after the cosmetology of the school. Cosmetic programs are mostly just technical schools. They tell you how to keep a pair of scissors and do basic techniques. Many more salons include in the salon program, so even if you have finished beauty school, now you have six months or even two years of internship. It's still paid, but you shadow other stylists, taking classes, and really honing your skills. When you are in a beauty school, you are learning basic techniques and basic haircuts. So you're treating someone's hair like one layer on someone's head. But with further education, you understand the art of layering and where you want the weight to lie in the haircut. So instead of doing one technique on your whole head, you'll learn things like how to combine three or four different techniques to create a more individual haircut for that guest. You will also learn the actual mechanics of the body behind the haircut because it is not just picking up scissors and using your hands; it's your whole body that gives you results. You are definitely more likely to get a job after going through higher education. As it is a practical industry, your resume has more work that you can show, either actually doing haircuts or showing a portfolio with photos of your work. 2. Some people won't take your career to be real real was a counselor in high school to ask me what I wanted to do after I graduated and I said I would like to be a hairdresser. And she said, No, what do you really want to do? They think you play with your hair and talk to people all day. Everything in haircut is all about geometry and everything in hair color is all about chemistry. It's not easy: Let's mix some of these things and hit him on the head or play with it. Your typical stylist week is Tuesday to Saturday. And to build your clientele, you really have to be there at night because you're going to have people coming after they've done the job. It's not a nine-to-five job at all. When you first start, the usual shift is from 12:00 to 21:00 with an hour's lunch. And the more you are available, especially at the beginning, the faster you are going to create your clientele. 4. Your work may be physically damaged if you do not take proper precautions. You make the same movements with your body, especially with your shoulder and wrist. The most basic disease stylists can get is back problems, carpal tunnel, and bursitis. You've been on your feet all day, too. I know my feet have evolved from wearing heels so often and I'll probably have a problem down the line, but the big thing is the floor you stand on. I was in salons with concrete floors. This is much different from standing on a wooden floor with uphol upholstery, which is the best surface to work with. And there are anti-fatigue mats that walk around the chairs to help prevent those problems that my salon uses. 5. You will need to walk a fine line between flashy and stylish. The general rule when it comes to the dress code is that we don't have to overshadow our guests. You don't want to wear anything crazy-flashy that's going to take away from your hair or makes you look like you're going to a disco. But at the same time, you want to have that stylish edge along with your professionalism because you are in the style of the industry. You don't have to be all this makeup, crazy person on trend but should look real. 6. You will be both a therapist and a hairdresser. You definitely have to be man to be in this profession. I'm in your life, and you feel a personal connection to me, but I'm not really in your life. I don't know your sister, your brother, or anyone in your family. So you can download and ventilation because I'm not going to go back and cause more upheaval in your life. I've been told crazy things over the years. I have this really silly story that I always use about how, when the World Wide Web started in 1995, was this episode of Good Morning America that talked about how it would be a fleeting affair. It was also the year I started beauty school, so from there, this theme can go so many different directions. 8. Not everyone will want to talk to you, and you have to respect that. When I start talking to someone and I don't get a lot of information from them, I kind of accept it that they just want to sit and relax and get their service done. So I'm not trying to make them feel like they have to talk. I've had guests tell me when I start asking them about their day that they just want to sit and relax, and I'm like, OK, I'm good, that's your experience. I feel like a lot of stylists, especially early on, wander around or just keep talking because they don't know what to do. You get insecure about your work sometimes. I love my job and I want to do my best to do what they want and make them feel good, and when I don't do it, I totally take it home. I stop at everything and I beat myself up terribly. I've had days where I just want to run under the lid and hide because I don't feel like I've done enough. So I do is dive into learning more or revising what I've done to figure out why it doesn't work and then I go ahead with my my so it works next time. 10. Bad haircuts are usually the result of poor advice. Many people don't really understand how emotional hair can be. I had a woman who wanted to cut off all her hair. She had long, beautiful hair, so I asked her why she wanted to cut it, and she gave me a lot of roundabout answers. I didn't feel like she really wanted to do it, and when I sat down and talked to her a little longer, I found out she was four or five months pregnant. So she's going through this big change in life, and I suggested we start slowly rather than cut it off all at once. Another thing I've learned to always go back to is what the guest wants, even if it's a guest that you've been doing for years or it's just finishing. You can't just assume that their same cut and the same color works for them - could it be better? 11. You will have to deal with some rude things that you have never heard of before. Most people don't know about hair shards, but they're worse than a shard tree today because they're so hard to get out - they're so small. Small hair can be embedded in your skin and if they are blonde you can't even see them, so they just stay there and get glier. Cleaning the color out of someone's hair, your hands will get stained even if you use gloves. And taking extensions out of sticky, dirty work. You're going to have someone who hasn't washed her hair in a week, or she's going to have some suffering on her scalp, and you're going to have to wash her hair. But I'm so used to it that it all really seems to bother me. 12. It will be harder than you think to find time for personal projects. Early in your career, you feel like you have all the time to try new things. But the busier your career, the more time you spend behind the chair. It's your paycheck. I feel like I never have enough time for everything I want to do as a stylist, whether it's more education or the whole creative side of the hairdresser. If you want to do Broadway shows or fashion shows or events, it takes time and find that outlet for it. No one's going to call you or give you a chance. 13. The work

you do will affect more than someone else's appearance. Something I learned along the way you are not just dealing with hair; You are dealing with the person and the emotions behind him. Everyone wants to feel good, and when your hair looks good, you feel good. When your hair looks bad, you feel bad. That's why I love my job. I can have someone come up with a full day shit and her come out with a smile because I just worked on her hair for an hour and now she feels good about herself.
