Comments from Squamish Nation Members	Some Points to Consider
The LNG facility may restrict access to Howe Sound	Access to the Woodfibre site has been limited since the Woodfibre Pulp and Paper Mill closed in 2006
Potential security measures at facility may impact Squamish Nation access to hunting, fishing, canoeing, cedar harvesting, visiting Wild Spirit Places, exploration, etc	✓ Woodfibre LNG will develop an Access Management Plan to the Project area for construction and operations periods
Squamish Nation members may not be able to practice their Aboriginal rights because of increased activity during construction and operation of the Project	As a condition of its Environmental Certificate from Canada, Woodfibre LNG must consult with Aboriginal groups about access issues before it starts construction
Information from Squamish Nation Traditional Land Use Studies needs to be incorporated into plans	As a condition of its Environmental Certificate from the Squamish Nation, Woodfibre LNG must provide "controlled and safe access to Squamish Nation members to practice Aboriginal Rights in surrounding area, and Woodfibre will support Squamish Nation in securing additional Crown land outside the Project control zone to develop trails, small vessel moorages, camp, and huts, to allow Squamish Nation members to exercise their rights
